



















- 1. Sun Jul 19 **LAMBERT & STAMP** 2 hrs R. In the early '60s, aspiring British filmmakers Chris Stamp and Kit Lambert decided to find a young band, manage it, and then make a film about the band's success. After discovering a group called High Numbers playing a raucous show at an overcrowded underground café, they hired the four young musicians, mentored and managed them, changed their name to The Who and created rock 'n' roll history. With rich archival footage and commentary from Pete Townshend and Roger Daltrey, James D. Cooper has directed a fascinating documentary about one of Rock's major bands. Experience his jaw-dropping journey in life and love, to the pinnacle of his achievements when he and wife Jean broke the BASE-jumping Guinness World Record. - 3. Sun Aug 2 **THE WOLFPACK** 1 hr 24 min R. Imagine six brothers forbidden by their eccentric father from leaving their apartment on the Lower East Side of Manhattan. Winner of Sundance's Grand Jury Prize for Documentary, The Wolfpack, directed by Crystal Moselle presents the story of how the Angulo brothers learn about the outside world through the films that they watch. The brothers spend their childhood re-enacting their favorite films using elaborate homemade props and costumes. With no friends and living on welfare, they feed their curiosity, creativity, and imagination with film, which allows them to escape from their feelings of isolation and loneliness. - 4. Sun Aug 9 **MERCHANTS OF DOUBT** 1 hr 36 min PG-13. Tonight's show is cosponsored by the Nevada County Climate Change Coalition and SYRCL's Wild & Scenic Film Festival Jan. 14-17, 2016. We anticipate that a panel of local experts will be on hand for a Q&A. Merchants of Doubt takes audiences on a satirically comedic, yet illuminating ride into the heart of conjuring American spin. Filmmaker Robert Kenner lifts the curtain on a secretive group of highly charismatic, silver-tongued pundits-for-hire who present themselves in the media as scientific authorities yet have the contrary aim of spreading maximum confusion about public threats ranging from toxic chemicals to pharmaceuticals to climate change. - 5. Sun Aug 16 **GEMMA BOVERY** 1 hr 40 min R. Life begins to imitate art in uncanny ways when earthy British beauty Gemma (Gemma Arterton) and her husband Charles Bovery (Jason Flemyng) move to the very same Norman village where the classic novel Madame Bovary was written a century earlier. Local baker and Flaubert fan Martin Joubert (Fabrice Luchini) falls for the lovely and charming newcomer and sets out to be her mentor. It doesn't take long before his wild imagination leads him to draw parallels between the literary and real life woman, as he insinuates himself into her life. She soon finds herself at a crossroads that seems to be fulfilling Joubert's worst fears. Director Anne Fontaine's clever adaptation of the graphic novel is at once a cheeky literary mash-up, a sensuous romance, a witty feminist commentary, and a heady celebration of French provincial life. She shuts herself off from everyone around her, wearing her "ordinary face." Anna never expected to meet a friend like Marnie, who does not judge Anna for being just what she is. But no sooner has Anna learned the loveliness of friendship than she begins to wonder about her newfound friend... Based on the novel by Joan G. Robinson, When Marnie Was There is the newest film from Studio Ghibli, and the second feature film by Hiromasa Yonebayashi, the director of The Secret World of Arrietty. "4 **Stars. A searing journey from youthful hopes and dreams to the edge of despair and back again, it's a film about young love, the futility of war and how to make sense of the darkest times. "Swedish actress Alicia Vikander plays Brittain as a high-spirited, determined young woman who embraces life without hesitation. What makes Vera Brittain's story so exceptional is the fluid way all these elements in her life, the passionate feminism, the love story, the war years and what they led to, naturally flow together. - 8. Fri, Sat & Sun Sep 4-6 **INFINITELY POLAR BEAR** 1 hr 30 min R. Writer-director Maya Forbes draws on a chapter of her own childhood in Infinitely Polar Bear, which stars Mark Ruffalo as Cameron, a man who suffers from bipolar disorder. After a breakdown forces him to leave his family and move into a halfway house, he attempts to rebuild a relationship with his two daughters, and win back the trust of his wife Maggie (Zoe Saldana). When Maggie decides to go to business school in New York, they decide that he will move back in and take care of the day-to-day care for the kids. Due to his mercurial nature, this leads to a series of quirky, funny, and sometimes embarrassing episodes. "This assured crowdpleaser marks an irresistible feature debut for writer-director Maya Forbes. Aided considerably by one of Mark Ruffalo's richest, most appealing performances, Forbes brings a marvelous warmth to this story of evolving family dynamics." –Justin Chang, Variety.
