- 1. Sun Sep 13 **A POEM IS A NAKED PERSON** 1 hr 30 min. A stirring mix of unbridled joy, *A Poem Is a Naked Person* presents Leon Russell as filmed by documentarian Les Blank between 1972 and 1974. Blank's camera lets us into the world of Russell and his friends and fellow artists, including Willie Nelson, in and around his recording studio in northeast Oklahoma, capturing intimate, off-the-cuff moments and combining them with mesmerizing scenes of Russell and his band performing live. This singular film about an artist and his community never got an official theatrical release and has attained legendary status. Now, after more than forty years, it can finally be seen and heard in all its rough beauty. - 2. Sun Sep 20 **LISTEN TO ME MARLON** 1 hr 42 min. Unbeknownst to the public, Marlon Brando a great star who remained deliberately mysterious for his entire professional life created a vast archive of personal audio and visual materials over the course of his lifetime, often deeply confessional and completely without vanity or evasion. Now for the first time ever those recordings come to life in Stevan Riley's new film. Charting Brando's exceptional career as an actor and his extraordinary life away from the stage and screen, the film reveals the complexities and contradictions that were Marlon Brando, by telling the story in his own words and only his own words. - 3. & 4. Sun Sep 27 & Sun Oct 4 DYING TO KNOW: RAM DASS & TIMOTHY LEARY 1 hr 36 min. In the early 1960s Harvard psychology professors Timothy Leary and Richard Alpert began probing the edges of consciousness through their experiments with psychedelics. Leary became the LSD guru, challenging convention and questioning authority. As a result, with his simple mantra "Turn On, Tune In, Drop Out," Leary spawned a global counter culture movement. Alpert journeyed to the East becoming Ram Dass, a spiritual teacher for an entire generation, author of "Be Here Now," who continues in his 80's teaching service through compassion. With interviews spanning 50 years this new documentary, narrated by Robert Redford, invites us to share their intimate and entertaining conversations including their last, encouraging us to ponder questions about life, death, drugs & the biggest mysteries of the human condition. With never before seen interviews of Leary and Ram Dass, director Gay Dillingham suggests that their contributions to the science of the mind and the heart are more relevant today than in the past. Blessed with delightful and articulate onscreen personalities, the film interweaves many elements to create a deep and joyful assessment of two iconic lives. "The idea of anything that expands our thinking beyond conventional borders has always been of interest to me. When I see the living, breathing portraits of these characters, especially the early archival footage – they were a kind of blessing, considering how they have been caricatured in later times. - 5. Sun Oct 11 **EL CAPITAN** 1 hr. Widely regarded as one of the best climbing films ever made, El Capitan has been unavailable for years. The original 16 mm film, faded and scratched over 40 years, was no longer good enough to show and to share... But a major digital restoration effort has resulted in a "new" version—not merely as good as the original film—but much better. Over 86,000 frames, one frame at a time, had to be digitally cleaned and repaired. Now you can experience this spectacular film on the big screen. Originally filmed in 1968 when climbing Yosemite Valley's 3,000-foot wall was in its infancy, finally finished ten years later in 1978, El Capitan has become a classic. Tonight's program also includes "40 Years Later," a new short film which features recent interviews with two of the climbers. Filmmaker Fred Padula will be here in person to provide the story of this film's unique and colorful history. Tonight's showing is a benefit for SYRCL's Wild & Scenic Film Festival Jan. 14-18, 2016. - 6. Sun Oct 18 **HOW TO CHANGE THE WORLD** 1 hr 50 min In 1971 a small group of activists set sail from Vancouver, Canada in an old fishing boat. Their mission was to stop Nixon's atomic bomb tests in Amchitka, a tiny island off the west coast of Alaska. It was from these humble but brave beginnings that Greenpeace was born. Chronicling the untold story behind the modern environmental movement and with access to dramatic archive footage that has not been seen for over 40 years, the film tells the fascinating story of eco-hero Robert Hunter and his part in the creation of what we now know as the global organization that is Greenpeace. - 7. Sun Oct 25 **THE ROCKY HORROR PICTURE SHOW** 1 hr 40 min R. Tonight we celebrate the 40th anniversary of this cult classic and the fact that this is the film that launched the Nevada Theatre Film Series back in January 1979. Sweethearts Brad (Barry Bostwick) and Janet (Susan Sarandon), stuck with a flat tire during a storm, discover the eerie mansion of Dr. Frank-N-Furter (Tim Curry), a flamboyant transvestite scientist. As their innocence is lost, Brad and Janet interact with a houseful of wild characters, including an ex-delivery-boy biker (Meat Loaf) and creepy butler Riff-Raff (Richard O'Brien). Through elaborate dances and rock songs, Frank-N-Furter reveals his latest creation, Rocky Horror. Tonight's show features live performance by Truth or Dare Dance Company and is a benefit for The Nevada Theatre. Tickets are \$20 in advance and \$25 at the door. LET'S DO THE TIME WARP AGAIN!!
- 8. Sun Nov 1 **BEST OF ENEMIES** 1 h4 27 min R. In the summer of 1968, television news changed forever. Dead last in the ratings, ABC hired two towering public intellectuals to debate each other during the Democratic and Republican national conventions. William F. Buckley, Jr. was a leading light of the new conservative movement. A Democrat and cousin to Jackie Onassis, Gore Vidal was a leftist novelist and polemicist. Armed with deep-seated distrust and enmity, Vidal and Buckley believed each other's political ideologies were

dangerous for America. With explosive exchanges, they pummeled out policy with personal insults and vicious threats-cementing their opposing political positions. It was unlike anything TV had ever broadcast, and all the more shocking because it was live and unscripted.
